When Claudius heard about these secret ceremonies, he was livid! He had Valentine jailed. Claudius wanted Valentine to stop marrying soldiers. The ruler also wanted him to renounce his god and begin worshiping Roman gods. Valentine kindly told Claudius that he would not worship Roman gods. His kind words impressed the leader, but they did not change Valentine's fate. It is believed the emperor had him killed on February 14.

Now each year on February 14, we encourage our friends and people that we love. We send cards, eat heart-shaped candy, and exchange small gifts. We treat each other kindly, just as St. Valentine did so many years ago.
